Dorothy Dyer visits the metro, enthusing adults and learners about reading

Mxit and literacy?

At the end of 2011 Paterson and Bethelsdorp High Schools registered as *FunDza Literacy Trust* beneficiaries and so received ten copies of each of the three *Harmony High* series titles, which their learners have read voraciously. Knowing the story behind the series and the literacy trust as well as the enjoyment these learners were getting from the series, RASA, the Reading Association of South Africa, decided to bring Dorothy Dyer, author of the series and trust member, to Port Elizabeth.

During her visit, Dorothy attended an Education Faculty Literacy Hub meeting, addressed student teachers and was the key note speaker at the RASA Open Day. However, the highlight of her visit was visiting these two schools and engaging with the learners. For the Grades 8, 9 and 10 school pupils this was a day to be remembered! Dorothy spoke about how she went about writing the series with the input of her township learners to ensure it was authentic, the photo-shoots to choose a model for the cover and the whole process of drafting and refining a text. Learners were also treated to a snippet of the next story and could give suggestions as to further stories, which might include a cousin from the Eastern Cape visiting Harmony High. *Dorothy is pictured alongside, signing books for learners.*



Dorothy also shared FunDza's latest initiative - mobi books! Learners were taken aback when told to take out their cellphones as she talked them through how to find books on the FunDza site on Mxit. Knowing that many learners have limited access to paper books, but still want to read, FunDza have promised to upload a book a week. A new title starts every Friday at midnight with a new chapter available from midnight each night.

If the cellphones are the dominant literacy practice for young learners then we should use this modality to provide learners with opportunities to read books. 2012 Research Seminar Series

Ms Priscilla Gitonga presented at the faculty research seminar series this month on *“It is possible through colour and rhyme” The value of Participatory Visual Research approaches and hip hop music in social and human science research.*

The presentation was based on her recently submitted doctoral study that set out to understand how hip hop contributes to the construction of personal identities of female late adolescents. Her research embraced participatory visual methodologies and hip hop music to elicit narratives from young women who strongly identify with hip hop music.
